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### Police, fire health benefits case moves ahead

JOLIET — Four retired Joliet police and firefighters have won another phase in their case claiming any change in their health benefits violates the Illinois constitution.

The case would likely have an impact on other government retirees not only from the city of Joliet but municipal work forces statewide. "This case is unique in that it is the only case dealing with whether the state constitution applies to health insurance and not just pensions," City Attorney Jeff Plyman said Wednesday. "That issue has never been tested before in Illinois."

The Joliet retirees contended that the Illinois constitution not only prohibits changes in pensions after retirement but also health care benefits. The city in January 2010 started a \$250 deductible to retirees' health insurance and increased drug co-payments by \$3 to \$5. Will County Associate Judge Bobbi Petrungaro ruled in October that the state constitution does provide the same protections to retiree health benefits as pensions, a decision expected to be tested at some point in state appellate court. - click here for more...

### State budgets under stress: Paths to sustainability

State governments have been noticeably absent in contributing to U.S. economic growth since the recession of 2008–09. Despite some recovery in tax revenues, many states are still reporting budget shortfalls and spending pressures for pensions and health care.

**Fiscal** stress at the state level is filtering down to local governments in the form of reduced aid, and this in turn is reflected in the loss of 539,000 state and local government jobs since August 2008. Are these budget woes primarily due to the fallout from a particularly harsh recession or are they the result of underlying structural problems in the state government sector that require new policy responses? On June 23–24, the Federal Reserve Banks of Chicago, New York, and Philadelphia, in conjunction with the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation and the National Association of State Budget Officers, convened a conference to examine how states are dealing with immediate fiscal pressures and whether new policies and governance structures are needed to improve the fiscal sustainability of the sector in the future. click here for more...

## Public safety retirees told to fight pension, benefits cuts

CENTRAL FALLS — A national police union lawyer told about 60 angry retired city police and firefighters Tuesday night that they should go to court and fight what he called an unconscionable decision by the state receiver to cut their pensions and health coverage. The retirees applauded when Jack Parlon, a lawyer for the national Fraternal Order of Police, said "someone should go to jail" over receiver Robert G. Flanders Jr.'s reduction in pension benefits by about 50 percent to save \$2.5 million this year. Flanders also required the retirees to pay 20 percent toward their health-insurance premiums.

Flanders has said he hoped to negotiate concession agreements rather than impose the cuts and higher costs, which he announced Monday in connection with petitioning the city into Chapter 9 bankruptcy. An initial hearing on the petition is Wednesday morning. Parlon told the gathering at the Cumberland Fraternal Order of Police Hall that they should put together a legal team to fight Flanders' order. The FOP can only represent active members and not retirees. But, he said, he and the national FOP were willing to help them raise money to wage that fight.
